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## Confres in Malawi urged to become effective shepherds

More so, we religious priests are called to be sacramentally oriented, prayerful (Lk 4:18-19), develop a good relationship with our Superiors, fellow brothers and the laity. 6. Synergize. Be alert and see entry points for a better life.
7. Sharpen the saw.

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
