Since the beginning of the work of evangelization and human development in the Western Province of Papua New Guinea the Montfort Missionaries have been at the forefront, well seconded by the Daughters of Wisdom and the Brothers of St. Gabriel. The other congregations that joined us over the years have always expected of us to play a key role in all the missionary efforts and strive to build up a family spirit among all the missionaries.

The Daughters of Wisdom and the Brothers of St. Gabriel were the first to venture into taking young Melanesians as members of their Congregations. The Montfort Missionaries admired their courage and their great faith but didn't seem in a hurry to do so.

Finally the Montfort Missionaries have now decided to go ahead with their Formation Program and are slowly planning the road to take on vocations and nurture them. This is not a short term commitment but a long term commitment. It takes thorough and precise planning. It takes funding and support from overseas. But most importantly it demands Montfort Missionaries who are willing to walk all the way with that project, meaning that they are ready to spend many years in PNG for that.

As Bishop of the Diocese this decision and commitment of the Montfort Missionaries give me a feeling of security and the assurance that the three Congregations will continue to be at the forefront of the Mission in the Western Province. I am grateful to God for this and ask him to always provide us with a group of good Montfort Missionaries who do not put their own interest before the interest of others and always walk with Mary in order to, like her, discern the will of God and put themselves totally at the service of his plan for them and the Congregation.

Food for the body, faith for the soul - Missionary task

I gave some seeds to Balimo Vocational Techigh and the community had planted the seedlings as pilot project, but the rats ate them up.



Fr. Mateus Juang is our confrere from Indonesia, he came to PNG in 2001. Where ever he goes he gets himself actively involved in the community development . Presently he is working in Balimo in a recently established parish. Since I arrived in this country in 2001, I have been promoting Agriculture because the soil is generally so fertile, especially Western Province.

When i was at the Refugee Camp in Iowara, East Awin, North Fly District, I launched the Year of Agriculture from 2003 to 2005 by encouraging schools and community to plant rice, i provided them

with 4 movable rice mills. After the first harvest, I gave 4 kg seeds to one of my priest friends at Nomad, because of his hard work and commitment more than 11 villages have rice.

When I was transferred to Kiunga January 2005, we launched the Year of Agriculture on Bible Sunday, 31st August 2005 to 2008 in St. Gerard's Parish Church. Since then I have been



promoting agriculture and challenged people through awareness on agriculture. In March 2008, I gave 20kg rice seeds to a priest working in the Mountain villages and now harvested 2 or 3 times in 5 villages. Since 20th December 2008, I was transferred to Daru to serve 2 Districts, South Fly and Middle Fly for spiritual care, but still promoting agriculture projects for the whole Province. We launched the Year of Agriculture in Daru and in Balimo. I gave some seeds to Balimo Vocational Tec-high and the community had planted the seedlings as pilot project, but rats ate them up.

Now, I am introducing both "dry and wet paddy field", especially wet paddy field, because we have large swamps and lagoons area. Besides that I am doing awareness on "Sago Flour Project and probably Sago Biscuits and Sago Noodles" to improve and sustain local people lives.

Why are we Promoting Agriculture?

1. Agriculture promotes "Back to nature" way of living. Compensation has been creating "disabled Society" in many ways.

Compensation makes people have no respect for the dignity and value of the land. In Melanesian society, land is highly respected that is the reason that people never sell their land.

2. It promotes equality where men and women, young and adult, husbands and wives can work together. It reduces women's burden in providing food. This also supports the Christian values that we promote this year: FREDOM "To be Free to

Walk Together in Christ." Women and men are working together.

3. It creates more jobs for our people, especially the young ones and people in the remote villages.

4. The proper explanation and understanding of agriculture can reduce:

Domestic violence and many other moral and social issues. Addiction to alcohol

Production, consumption and distribution of

marijuana that kills life, agriculture gives life to the people.

- Respect for other's properties.
- Agriculture promotes "Positive Living" in many ways and improves the economy. It changes dependent community/society to independence society.

Flooding in Kuem

Very often few villages of our parish, St. Peter's Parish, Bosset, in the Western Province, is flooded due to torrential rains. People live a very difficulty life due to flooding, their gardens destroyed, houses leak, children sick and life becomes very gloomy.

To get help from outside it is not so easy due to the communication problem. The way to communicate from thes villages is via two way radio system, but most often due to the mishandling of the equipment it does not work.

One of the worst affected village was Kuem where water was very high. I tried to get help from one of our sisters who

was making her health patrols but since we did not have the accurate report of the situation we could get ourselves organized.

The parish team made a patrol to the affected villages, to give whatever assistance possible to those who are suffering.

We first went to Kuem, it is a village in the eastern side of Agu River, it flows about 300 miles to reach fly river. We used 40hp and 23 long foot dinghy. It took us about 21/2hours to reach the village. As we were travelling we could see the destruction that the flooding has done to these villages. The stable food of the people is sago, They also plant banana, sweet potatoes, yam, taro, tapioca and greens in their garden. For the protein, they go fishing or hunting, the nature provides it for them.

> When I saw the situation of the people in the village I could not hold my tears. Many houses were under water, all the gardens destroyed, people had no place to stay. Without food and drinking water, people were helpless. Few people had their crocodile farms, due to flood all the crocodiles either died or washed away in the flood

> Another worst affected village was Waigini. It is a refugee camp at the bank of Fly Rive. There were about 35 people living in this camp. When we arrived at the village, there were no people,


everyone had left the village as it was not safe to stay since the Fly River was very high and water was entering their houses.

As we were looking around, we heard a baby crying, and we found a mother with 3 children in one of the houses, one baby was only 3 months old, she was also very sick.

We did whatever we could to help people, since we had a nurse with us, she could also help few people who were in need of medical attention, I was able to share some of the food items that I took with me.


When the Mother Nature causes destruction, there is nothing much that we could do other then be alert and take precaution.
